	discusses Cavalier and Metaphysical poetry tradition and the writers who wrote in this tradition, compares and contrasts these two schools of poetry.
Course Content	In this course, after introducing the Renaissance and 17th century English literature along with their historical, social and cultural contexts, selected writers and their works are analysed, discussed and interpreted.
