The course also aims to enable the student to analyse examples of post-Republican Turkish poetry in a comparative manner.

## **Course Content**

In this course, the movements of poetry seen in 19th century England, Ireland, Scotland, Russia, and Iran are analysed and examined through selected poems. In addition to these countries, the dramatic movements in early 20th century America, Germany, and France are also analysed and examined through selected poems. Also, the effects of these movements on post-Republican Turkish poetry are exemplified through selected poems. Finally, the examples of European, American and Turkish poems are compared in terms of their form and content.
